



Those in the sanctuary for the congregational meeting will also remember the heroic efforts of our tech team to make the zoom link work and the equally heroic efforts from our Moderator, Reverend Raymond Bonwell, as he filled the gap with an impromptu monologue on Presbyterian polity, history and eventually even a pirate joke. The congregational meeting then turned to the serious business of approving the terms of call for the next year for Casey. With this vote, we have put both WPC and Casey on a dynamic path to the future that God is calling us to fulfill.

Many of us were able to gather for a reception where we had an opportunity to personally wish Casey well and hear a few reflections on his time with us. His initial vision for the Common Place has evolved into a nationwide example of creative community ministry. Both TCP and WPC are still benefiting from Casey's leadership of a successful capital campaign. Our parting gift to Casey is a framed picture of the founding statement for the school of love, Casey's favorite stained glass window and the exterior of the church. A symbol of what we are called to be, God's faithfulness and the physical launching pad for our ministry.

As we look forward, WPC has many blessings. A church building that is in great shape and is equipped for the future, a strong financial position, a restructured staff, vibrant programming in spite of the pandemic and leadership at every level that is poised to do great things.

Just as Casey emboldened us to address the future in spite of uncertainties, we all join together in wishing Casey well in the next chapter of his ministry. We pray that God will continue to abide with you, guide you and uplift you. Just as you declared that you are "rooting for WPC", we are rooting for you and will delight in hearing where God will next use you.












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



THE WINGS WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY WINTER/ SPRING 2022 COURSE SELECTION



OUR TWO PASTORS GALLOWAYS THE LIFE OF "PASTOR'S KID" ISN'T EASY BY GEORGE AMAN



It wasn't easy for young John Galloway to grow up as the "pastor's kid" in a big church like Wayne Presbyterian. For WPC members and staff as well, it probably seemed a mixed blessing having a super-bright, effervescent "PK" running around our rambling church facility.

Our present beloved Pastor Emeritus, Rev. Dr. John T. Galloway Jr., was seven years old in 1948 when his father, John T., Sr. was called as senior pastor of our church. John Jr.'s grandfather, The Rev. Hugh K. Galloway, yet another Presbyterian minister, was reportedly a strict Sabbatarian – nothing but church and family on blue Sundays.

Some of that pious regimen carried over into the Galloway's big church manse on South Wayne Avenue. During their school days in Radnor, John Jr and his younger sister Harlene were not permitted to do homework on Sunday. According to son Scott Galloway, his father never watched television or movies on Sundays either.

But early on, John Jr. had developed an independent streak, possibly due to the moderating influence of his gracious mother "Billie". For instance, when his birthday arrived during that bustling first year in Wayne, his parents said they didn't have time to organize a birthday party for him. Undeterred, "Gus" as he was known to chums, walked home from school bringing several of his friends home to have a party anyway. So, the softhearted Billie rushed to the Delaware Market across from the church store and bought ice cream for the group.

Society in America after WWII was accompanied by a boom in religion. It was not surprising that under its dynamic young preacher Wayne Presbyterian's growth was extraordinary. John Jr. recalls that underlying that surge in new membership was his father's highly organized approach to recruiting. Every Sunday, worshippers were encouraged to provide contact information and staff members were detailed to make prompt follow-up calls and prepare prospect cards.

After each Sunday service, moreover, as people came up to shake his hand, John Sr. would nudge a well-briefed church Elder stationed at his elbow. The Elder would step in and introduce himself – allowing the pastor to personalize his own greeting! This unobtrusive attention to detail helped generate new annual memberships ranging from 200 to 400 additional families.

Dr. John, Sr. also found a way to rapidly bring the male new members into the leadership of the church. He created a unique "Board" (the men liked that!) called the Stewards. Their function was to tabulate Sunday morning offerings – as they still do. But they also made regular home visits to members to promote church activities (and follow up on "Estimates of Giving").

As with many churches of that era, during John Sr.'s tenure, which ended in 1973, our WPC Board of Stewards, like our Elder, Deacon, and Trustee Boards, did not include even one woman! (Just 4 years later under pastor Rev. Wesley Baker, ladies were very well represented on all those boards.)

Among those who John Sr. attracted to leadership roles were eminent local men like patent attorney John Howson and businessman Harold Beebe. They teamed together in 1950 to undertake WPC's first capital fund drive. With proceeds from this drive, we renovated the Sunday school and enlarged the chancel to accommodate the choir.

John Jr. says his father was "driven by music." Not a good singer himself, he had enjoyed the "Stepsinging" tradition when he attended Muskingum College in Ohio. John Sr. wrote many hymns and a four-line introit which was sung by the choir before each of his sermons. To develop the Sunday chancel choir and direct the newly formed Wayne Oratorio Society, he brought in Sherwood Kains, a prominent choral director. Later, he hired a brilliant 20-year-old organist named David Spicer who further expanded the adult choirs and added youth groups as well.

John Sr. was a Trustee of Princeton Theological Seminary (as later was John Jr.) which enabled him to select the brightest students as WPC assistant ministers.

The third element in John Sr's growth strategy were his sermons - biblically based and deeply researched. He was a voracious reader. Every day or two he dropped another book on a church secretary's desk with a half-dozen bookmarked passages carefully underlined with several subject headings.

These quotes were transcribed on 5 x 7-inch cards and the cards carefully filed in a huge file cabinet. As he prepared his sermons, John Sr. had related quotation cards plucked from the file cabinet and included them in his presentation.

John Sr. carefully wrote out his sermons in full, and copies were always available on the table in the vestibule. His sermon delivery never sounded like he was reading. John Jr. explained that his father was an orator in the old style, having studied that discipline in college and was runner up in a national oratory contest.

Not unsurprisingly, John Jr. followed his father's approach and kept church secretaries very busy during his own illustrious 14 years in our pulpit.

John went through the Radnor public school system but spent many hours at the church. One time when he was caught running around the sanctuary, an elderly member told him to stop. John retorted that it was alright for him to run in his father's church.

In due course, PK Galloway was confirmed as a member of Wayne Presbyterian and served as president of the high school fellowship. He graduated from Princeton University and Princeton Theological Seminary. John Jr. was ordained a minister in the Presbyterian Church USA in a moving service at WPC. As he described it, his father so overcome with tears of joy that he was almost unable to read his part in the ceremony.

John Sr. passed to a well-deserved presence with his Father in heaven. To everyone's delight, our present Pastor Emeritus, The Rev. John T. Galloway Jr. may be greeted most Sundays in his customary pew on right side of the Sanctuary along with his dear wife Nancy.
