Clerk of Session Report and Church Statistics

At the close of 2018, Wayne Presbyterian Church had 2311 active members and 28 affiliate members.

In 2019, we observed the Sacrament of Holy Communion together eight times, including Epiphany Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Pentecost, World Communion Sunday and Advent. In addition, the changes to the format of the 11:00 service included observation of Holy Communion by intinction.

Our pastoral staff continued to undergo transition during 2019. Interim Association Pastor for Education, Fellowship and Discipleship, Rev. Adam Hearlson, was called to be head of staff at Overbrook Presbyterian Church and resigned as Interim Associate Pastor in spring of 2019. Rev. Anne Clark Duncan continued in her role as part-time Minister for Pastoral Care. Rev. Cheni Konge joined our staff, initially as Interim Associate Pastor, and later, in accordance with Session approval, became Interim Executive Pastor.

Session, in conjunction therewith, approved the future pastoral staffing to include, in addition to Head of Staff Rev. Casey Thompson, Executive Pastor and Associate Program Pastor. The Associate Pastor Nominating Committee ("APNC") was formed and commissioned in May of 2019 to search for candidates to fulfill these two Associate Pastoral positions, Executive Pastor and Program Pastor. As of this writing, the APNC is in its final stages for a call for Executive Pastor, and will continue its search thereafter for Associate Program Pastor.

Our pastors baptized 15 children. We brought in 40 new members including 21 confirmands, many of whom had been baptized and come to faith in Christ at WPC.

66 moved or began worshiping at other churches. We wish them well in their new communities of faith.

Annual Meeting of the Congregation

January 27, 2019

The Annual meeting of the Congregation of the Wayne Presbyterian Church was held on Sunday, January 27, 2019 in the sanctuary. The Moderator, the Reverend L. Casey Thompson, convened the meeting following the completion of the 9:30 A.M. worship service. A quorum of members in attendance was declared. Rev. Thompson announced the purposes of the meeting:

- Distribution of the 2018 Annual Report
- Approval of the minutes of the 2018 Congregational meetings
- Presentation of the "School for Love," a new vision for Wayne Presbyterian Church
- Regarding the Congressional Survey and Mission
- Election of at-large members of the 2019-2020 Nominating Committee
- Presentation of the Session-approved 2019 Budget
- Adjourn with Prayer

The call of the meeting had been stated in the church bulletin and announced from the pulpit on the three preceding Sundays.

On a motion duly made, seconded and passed, the reading of the minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation held on January 29, 2018, was waived and the minutes were approved as printed in the 2018 Annual Report.

Rev. Thompson as Moderator presented the vision for Wayne Presbyterian Church as a "School for Love," noting that we are all fallible people, but wishing to do better. Noting that "love is a better way," the three tenets of the School for Love is to love God, to love our neighbors, and to love ourselves. Each of the three is incorporated into the overall mission of Wayne Presbyterian Church, including worship services, adult education, loving our neighbors with outreach, deacons' voluminous activities, supporting our mission in outreach, including The Common Place, grant to

Radnor Township Community Association for racial reconciliation, and congregational fellowship fostering love of self "You are loved, you are worthy of love." This is not to be equated with selfishness or self-righteousness, but rather worthiness of all God's children.

The School for Love vision is infused into the coming 150th anniversary of Wayne Presbyterian Church, occurring in 2020—a time of celebration.

Rev. Thompson and members of the Mission Study Committee presented commentary on the recently completed congregational survey. The survey confirmed that Wayne is a "clergy-centered" church, noting that specific responses reveal a minority of the membership highly satisfied, another minority of the membership unsatisfied in some aspects of church life, with the largest group "in the middle"—generally satisfied, but with issues to be addressed and hopefully resolved.

The Mission Study Committee was chaired by Elder Mark Fabere (Chair of the Communications and Technology Committee) with Janice Mack, John Murphy and Linda Teets. John Murphy noted that the principal purpose of the Mission Study was in conjunction with a requirement for calling new associate pastors. Linda Teets thanked those who took part in the survey (a total of 413 congregational members) and noted that a follow-up presentation and meeting will be held at 11:30 am on February 3rd in Chapel Hall. Janice Mack noted that Session will receive the Mission Study and then it will be submitted to Presbytery in accordance with prerequisites for the APNC to commence its search for Associate Pastors.

The Moderator called on Elder Susi Bruhns, Chair of the Nominating Committee. Elder Bruhns listed the members of the nominating committee and thanked them for their efforts.

Elder Bruhns placed the names of the following persons in nomination for the office of Elder; the names have been included in the 2019 Annual Report:

There were no further nominations, and on a **motion** duly made, seconded and **passed** unanimously, the nominations were closed and the nominees elected.

The Moderator thanked Elder Bruhns and the Nominating Committee, and the congregation responded with applause. The Moderator then thanked all the Elders, Deacons and Stewards retiring in 2019 for their service.

The Moderator introduced Elder Lisa Packer, Chair of the Personnel Committee. Elder Packer referred the congregation to her Personnel Committee written report appearing at pages 9 and 10 of the Annual Report booklet. She highlighted some of the changes in personnel and administration during 2018 and looking forward to 2019, including that the nursery school has hired a new director (Ms. Dana Arranz), that Ms. Connie Beecher has been hired as Communications and Connections Leader, that Rev. Sara Hostetter's position has been expanded to include Director of Mission, that the Personnel Committee meets with all staff annually for evaluation and feedback, that employee contributions to health insurance is being increased over the next several years.

Treasurer of Wayne Presbyterian Church, Vijay Aggarwal, reported on the 2018 financial condition of the church, noting that donations were 1% above the budget's estimates, and that approximately \$175,000 from the church's endowment was used to support expenses (instead of the original estimate of \$218,000 from the endowment and dedicated funds).

Treasurer Aggarwal also discussed the 2019 budget, which is reproduced, along with 2018 budget and

actual expenditures and revenues, on page 8 of the Annual Report booklet. Unusual expenses have included repairing flood damage to Davidson Hall, with an expectation of at least some reimbursement from insurance for those expenditures. The year-end balance of the treasurer's endowment is approximately \$5.2 million dollars.

The Moderator then asked if there was any further business to come before the Congregational meeting before proceeding directly to the Corporation meeting. Since there was none, the Moderator adjourned the meeting with prayer.

Annual Meeting of the Corporation

January 27, 2019

Upon completion of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation, Moderator Reverend Casey Thompson called the Annual Meeting of the Corporation to order, calling upon Elder Howard Holden, Chair of the Administration Committee, to chair the meeting. Elder Holden noted that the church is within the scope of a Section 501.C3 non-profit corporation. He noted that a quorum of the membership (i.e., the membership of the church) was present, and noted that he did not have further information to submit over and above that which was submitted concerning the financial status of the church during the Annual Meeting of the Congregation. Elder Holden solicited any questions from the audience, at which no questions were raised and, pursuant to motion to adjourn, which was then seconded, the membership voted to adjourn the Annual Meeting of the Corporation.

Office of Finance

The Office of Finance, under the leadership of the Director of Finance, is responsible for overseeing and implementing the financial operations at Wayne Presbyterian Church and its ministries. The Director works closely with the Senior Pastor, Church Treasurer and members of Session to insure the sound financial management of the church. Finance also supports the annual Stewardship Campaign and maintains relationships with contributors to the church by recording payments, sending reminder letters and letters of appreciation for gifts and estimates of giving. Ruth Wisniewski supports many of the functions of this office.

In coordination with the Facility Manager and Administration Committee, Finance oversees vendor relationships (utilities, lawn care, etc.) and maintains all building use permits. The Director serves as the primary administrator for all financial purveyors and systems including database management, banking systems and payroll programs. The office of Finance prepares and analyzes financial statements for each ministry area of the church, the Nursery School and The Common Place, as well as reports for each committee chair of the Session, the Deacon Board Moderator and Treasurer. The Endowment Fund reconciliation is handled by the Office of Finance, as is the yearly external review or audit process. Workers' Compensation audits are also managed in this office.

All personnel files are held in this office, along with payroll system, accounting records and contracts for workers' compensation, property and liability insurance.

The director manages the payment of employment benefits. In consultation with appropriate committees of Session and the Facilities Manager, the Director and Treasurer solicit bids from service providers, health insurance providers and others that service the church to insure cost effective operations.

Direct debits for electronic giving are managed by the director of Finance as are all donations made in memory of deceased members. Each giver is sent a letter for tax purposes. Both donors and next of kin are notified by letter from this office.

Staff credit card usage and payments are managed by Finance, as are payments to all vendors and contract employees, such as special event musicians, interns, artists and designers. The careful management and monitoring of financial plans and annual budgets insures that the Church has designated the appropriate financial resources to achieve its mission and vision.

Administration Committee

The Administration Committee has responsibility for oversight of the Church's operating budget and financial records. Sub-committees include Property (the safety, maintenance & improvement of the facilities), co-chaired by Weezie Duff and Howard Holden; Township Relations, chaired by Sandy Kheradi, and Endowment chaired by Bill Lawrence.

This past year the Property committee oversaw the installation of a new playground roof system as well as restoration of rooms 208 & 209 below. The committee is currently considering restoration of the Sanctuary lighting since existing technology is no longer manufactured. Alongside of the personnel committee it assisted in hiring a part-time facilities manager to oversee the church's significant and aging buildings as well as the hiring of an outsourced custodial firm.

The Township Relations committee continues to maintain good working relations between the Church and Township elected and appointed officials as well as overseeing WPC's income from the shared partnership with Radnor from the parking lot.

The endowment had a third quarter value of \$5,511,195 up from last year's closing value of \$4,993,698. Current asset allocation is approximately 70% Equities and 30% Fixed income.

The current Administration Committee members are: Vijay Aggarwal (Treasurer), Brook Cheston, Weezie Duff, Sandi Kheradi, Bill Lawrence, Neil Hartman (Director of Finance and Administration), and Howard Holden.

Notes to Financial Statement

2019 Actual

Regular offerings were below budget by 26K while other income was above budget by 7K. Donations by unpledged offerings and non-budgeted offerings were at all-time highs. Personnel was below budget primarily due to Pastoral vacancies. Maintenance and utilities were above budget due to higher gas and maintenance expenses. Overall expenses were 21K above budget. For the year we recorded a deficit of 40.5K.

Dedicated funds are funds that have been donated in prior years for specific purposes such as Mission, property repair and worship and music expenses. In the prior annual report we showed the 2019 budget combined with budgeted spending from dedicated funds. During the course of the year, Session and Committees of Session have approved additional spending from dedicated funds. In this report, for ease of comparison, 2019 spending from dedicated funds has been subtracted from the financial statement and is shown separately in the table below:

2020 Budget

Pledged income is budgeted to be 20K lower than 2019, however unpledged income is expected to increase relative to the amount budgeted for 2019. We have reduced the draw from the endowment from 6% in 2019 to the historical rate of 5% in 2020. Expenses

for custodial services have been moved from personnel to maintenance and utilities. Mission spending is reduced from last year's actuals due to a 15K reduction in support for The Common Place.

In addition to the budgeted amounts, Session has approved the use of endowment funds to support increased fundraising activities in 2020 and the creation of a Pastoral Associate position.

A generous donor has contributed funds to eliminate the deficit incurred in 2019 and as a result, we enter 2020 debt-free with a slight surplus and an expectation of a balanced budget in 2020.

2019 WPC ANNUAL REPORT

Adult Education Committee

One Book, One Church (OBOC) has been a time to gather as a community to discuss, listen, ponder and build relationships around a book. This year's selection, Shanghai Faithful by Jennifer Lin, was a compelling multi-generational story of a Chinese family's journey of faith in China and the US. The church facilitated book club discussions, arranged for professors, Christie Chow Chui-Shan and Joseph Lee, who taught about the spread of Christianity and the Chinese government's response to it and lastly hosted author Jennifer Lin about the process of researching the book to share her family's story.

Wayne Presbyterian Book Club holds discussion groups around a particular book several times a year. This year the group read and discussed *Peace Like a* River by Leif Enger and The Day the World Came to Town: 9/11 in Gander, Newfoundland by Jim Defede. A group of church members attended the Broadway Award winning play Come from Away, which was based on Defede's book.

Food and Faith was a fun and creative class that wove theology themes into cooking and eating! A few highlights were: the tour of the Farminary at Princeton Seminary and learning from Rich McFarland about his beekeeping and making a Salted Honey Pie. The eightweek class was held Tuesday mornings, hands-on in WPC kitchen.

In commemoration of Black History Month, on three Sundays in February, two long-time local residents (Kevin Stroman and Pam Deans) and several of their family members shared their experiences and led a discussion about "Being Black in Wayne." We are grateful to these friends of our church for their willingness to engage in open and honest conversations with us about the continuing racism in our country and community.

Prayer Practices to Enrich Your Life of Faith was the title of a three-Sunday series in March, led by the three Elder and Chair

WPC Spiritual Directors, Buff Barnes, Ellie Stratton, and Jeanne Kauffman, discussing and modeling Centering Prayer, Lectio Divina, and The Prayer of Examen. Each attendee received a copy of *A Diary of Private* Prayer by John Baillie for personal use, provided by an anonymous donor.

For the summer months, Adult Education moved outdoors, sponsoring three Sunday afternoon trips to local public gardens (Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens, Chanticleer, and Stoneleigh), where we shared fellowship, snacks, and the beauty of nature.

In September, Jeff Chu gave a splendid illustrated lecture, "Fruit for Food and Leaves for Healing: God's Promise of Renewal in Times of Despair," based on his experience at the Princeton Farminary, in which he emphasized care for our earth, and asked, 'What could you do with what you throw away?'

Carol Austin, Director of First-Up, and Donna Cooper, Director of Public Citizens for Children and Youth, spoke on September 15 and 22, respectively, about the need for and a path toward high quality early childhood education in Pennsylvania.

Eastern University Chaplain Joe Modica taught two excellent, well attended series of classes this year, a study of Revelation in the spring and a course on the Jewishness of Jesus in the fall.

In October, James Barnes coordinated a four-week course titled Conversations in the School for Love that was team taught with other faculty from Villanova University. It was an interactive, practical and enjoyable way to increase our love for God, for others and for ourselves.

In November, Elizabeth Castleman coordinated a three-week course based on The Sticky Faith Guide for Your Family by Dr. Kara E. Powell.

In December Elders Gary Jones and Joe VanderVeer taught a three-week class discussing various types of Love, using Aristotelian definitions, scriptural verses and beloved hymns.

Children's **Ministry**

The Children's Ministry of Wayne Presbyterian Church guides education, worship, mission and fellowship opportunities for families with children from birth through fifth grade. Our goal is to partner with parents to nurture the faith formation and spiritual development of children and families. We do this through ministries that are Christ-centered and developmentally relevant.

Education

The Sunday school program continued to be the cornerstone of our ministry with children. We met each Sunday from 9:30–10:30 am. Our dedicated teachers provided opportunities for our children to learn about God through teaching, singing, interactive games and thought-provoking conversation. We currently have 35 teachers who shepherd nearly 55 children each week. The teachers met throughout the school year to share ideas and support one another as well as to plan for future lessons and themes.

We continued to support and encourage families with special needs children. An inclusion specialist has been a tremendous addition to our staff.

Bibles were distributed to our children to provide age-appropriate texts to read at home and study each Sunday. 5th graders received NRSV study Bibles. 1st graders received NIV children's Bibles. 2 year olds received Bible storybooks.

Our Sunday school ended with a rousing YESS (Year End Sunday School) Celebration in June. Each class had an opportunity to share something they had prepared. Delightful!!

Worship

Joyful Noise began each Sunday school hour in Children's Ministry. The children gathered to sing, pray, and celebrate. Our Joyful Noise worship includes learning several important elements of worship (the Doxology, Lord's Prayer, etc). We continued to encourage families to worship together at 11:00 am. A Children's Message and Children's Church were offered at the third hour. A Communion Education Class was

offered on a Saturday to help families understand this holy sacrament and celebrate together.

Mission

Mission continued to be an important part of our ministry. During Lent, children participated in the One Great Hour of Sharing collection by filling their "fish banks" and returning them to worship on Palm Sunday. During the Thanksgiving season, we collected food for the Great Valley Food Cupboard. In addition, children donated toys for our Christmas toy collection for **Gemma Services**. Our VBS offering was given to support the education of children in Liberia through God's Precious Children. Finally, the Kids4Kids fund continued to collect funds for any special needs that arise throughout the year.

Fellowship

Finding meaningful settings for our families to connect with one another was a priority in Children's Ministry. Each Sunday school class hosted an Open House in October for parents to meet the teachers and one another. In addition to the ever-popular Advent **Dinner**, we added a **Lenten Event** for families this year. The Chapel was filled for both of these events, sending a clear message that this type of activity is well received by our families.

Our favorite kids-only fellowship activities in Children's Ministry are **Dinner and a Movie** and **KidZone**. Both are for children in kindergarten through 5th grade. Dinner and a Movie met once a month on a Friday evening for pizza and a movie on the big screen in the Chapel. It is the goal of this event to provide a place for children to bring their friends to experience the 'fun' of church together. KidZone also seeks to create a fun and inviting place for kids to experience the joy of hanging out together, learning and serving. We met at the church on selected days when the children did not have school. KidZone is designed with activity, service, community building and Bible study in mind.

The Annual **Pancake Breakfast** in February was an opportunity for our children (4th and 5th graders) to serve the larger church by preparing a feast for the congregation. It was held on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday each year.

Other special events for our "big kids" included an Extravaganza (fun and fellowship event at the church) in the spring and a field trip to the Biblical Tabernacle in Lancaster, PA, in the fall.

Also noteworthy:

Our **Vacation Bible School** hit it out of the park again this past summer! Of special note is that nearly all of the volunteer staff from 2018 returned to serve in 2019. The 200+ children and I are most grateful!

Special emphasis was given to some **facilities updates** in 2019. New area carpets and wall decorations have brightened the education building considerably.

I was grateful to attend the annual **Association of Presbyterian Church Educators** in Galveston, TX, in February.

A new **Children's Ministry Logo** and communication materials were created. Many, many thanks to Connie Beecher!

We owe a debt of gratitude to **our nursery coordinator, Jenny Moeckel**. She is the first face that many of our new families meet when they visit. Miss Jenny the one to whom all of our parents entrust their tiny ones. Her sweet spirit and welcoming demeanor are tremendous gifts to our church family.

We look forward to 2020 with great anticipation for all that the Lord might have in store.

Congregational Care Committee

The Congregational Care Committee's goal is to envision and implement programs that serve the spiritual, emotional and practical needs that confront us along life's journey; and assist WPC members and the community to love their lives more abundantly by helping themselves and their loved ones.

The programs below represent a broad array of support and education for WPC members and the community during the various transitions in our lives.

Marriage Preparation

This year Lori Dziedziak served four couples with our premarital prep program and two additional couples started the premarital prep. One of the weddings was performed off sight. All couples who plan to have their wedding at Wayne are recommended to complete the six-hour program with an individual facilitator using the *Prepare/Enrich Inventory*. Couples work with the trained facilitator through a variety of topics like Family of Origin, Communication, Conflict, Faith, Finances, and Intimacy using the *Prepare Inventory* to assist with focusing on area of Growth and Strength.

Mental Health

The mental health ministry at WPC has shown great growth during the past year under the leadership of Nancy Dever. The support group for parents with children struggling with anxiety or depression (PSAD) continues to grow and meets weekly. Members from our church and the community come whenever they can to share their struggles navigating the complexities of mental health struggles within their own families. On average around 12–15 people meet each week and the email list has grown to 61 members. Our goal within the mental health ministry is to continue to be a light for our church members and the community through education, support, companionship and prayer.

In October of 2019 Congregational Care sponsored two adult education classes. One on Suicide prevention and one on Mental issues and concerns. We will continue to offer adult education on these topics. On Sunday, October 26 we held a QPR training (Suicide Prevention/Intervention training).

An upcoming event for parents, grandparents, and anyone working with young people on the topic of building resilience will be held on January 26. Authors Dr. Rostain and Dr. Hibbs will be speaking on their book *Preparing your Child to Survive and Thrive* from 6–8 pm in the church sanctuary.

Walking the Mourner's Path

Walking the Mourner's Path is a program to support people who have lost a family member or close friend. One session ran from February 28 to April 18, 2019. Another session began on November 17, 2019, at St. David's Episcopal Church.

Caregivers and Divorce Care

Both programs are being presented again to the congregation to see what the interest and need is, and we hope to offer both groups beginning in the spring of 2020.

We are looking for new members to join this committee and new programs to correspond with the needs within the congregation. Deacon Board

The role of the Deacons, as described in Scripture, is to "fulfill a ministry of compassion, witness and service, sharing the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, those burdened by unjust policies or structures, or anyone in distress."

Our continued goals for 2019 and 2020 are to make the Deacon presence known throughout the Wayne Presbyterian family, especially to the membership we were charged to comfort in Scripture, and to connect with more church members with both cross-generational activities and one on one visitation. Going forward we hope to extend awareness of the happenings in our church throughout the community to attract support for those activities and interest in our church.

Our board consists of 42 Deacons elected for a threeyear term and 2 youth Deacons serving a one-year term.

We are striving to let members of the congregation know who the Deacons are and what we do, in the hope that if they, or someone they know could benefit from a visit, a phone call, or a meal to tell a Deacon.

We carry out this mission through the board's leadership and its committees. Cheni Khonje serves as our advisor from the pastoral staff. Sue Metzger is our co-moderator, Weezie Duff is our secretary keeping track of our meetings and publishing our minutes, which is vital to keeping our board organized, and Park Blatchford is our treasurer.

Our board is organized into 3 committees with a chair for each one:

- Care and Compassion, chaired by Jennie Hagin,
- Congregational Service, chaired by Tim Zaro
- Community Service, chaired by Mary Ellen Smith

Care and Compassion Committee

Visitation

We continue to be mindful that individuals who cannot easily attend church services and events, or are not computer savvy, or are struggling for other reasons may be feeling isolated from their Wayne family. With the addition of more Deacons on our board, under Jennie's leadership, we have been able to increase monthly visits to church members who would enjoy catching up with what's going on at the church and people who might just benefit from a shared smile or a funny story. The hope is that the connection forged between these members and those who visit them will continue beyond their time as a Deacon. The committee members have been or will receive special training on visitation from Cheni Khonje and Debby Jones. Going forward we hope to find ways to identify and reach more of our Wayne family.

Meal Delivery

The Deacons coordinated the delivery of meals made by Deacons as well as other members of the WPC community to the families undergoing difficult times. This is another opportunity to connect with members of our Wayne family.

Flower Delivery

We delivered 79 Christmas Poinsettias and approximately 79 Easter Daffodils to those members unable to worship with us. Most of those deliveries involved extended visits by Deacons. A card outlining the online streaming of our Sunday service was reviewed with the recipients and each was asked if they knew anyone who needs a ride, a meal or a visit (or if they themselves need it).

Birthday Cards

Approximately 60 birthday cards were sent out to WPC members who have reached the golden age of 90. Becky Greenhow facilitated this ministry again this year.

Congregational Services Committee

Senior Adult Program Ministry

Our committee plans, organizes, and executes a variety of events throughout the year for seniors. This year we had a total of 11 events. There were 3 Communion services at Shannondell, 2 musical concerts - the Bell Choir at Shannondell in March and the Choral Scholars at Dunwoody in April, a cocktail party at Shannondell in November, 2 Chef Lunches in the Chapel, a Youth Day in May and a Jr.-Sr. Christmas party both at Shannondell, and a trip to the Sight and Sound Theater in Lancaster in December to see the production "Miracle of Christmas." Our intent with all of these activities is to increase the engagement and connection between the church and our seniors in a variety of entertaining and meaningful ways. Deacons Jill Keefer Hugill, Ian Robertson, Ellen Greene, Lani Fabere, and Tim Zaro worked as a part of the senior adult programming ministry this year.

Transportation

We continue to offer rides to church as well as Oratorio and Music Transforms concerts for members of our congregation. We currently have 7 drivers (both current and former Deacons) who provide this service. We also ran a test program of sorts by providing charter bus service for both Shannondell and Dunwoody members to the Christmas Oratorio concert. Bill Gillespie continues to ably manage the rides ministry.

Communications / Audio

This year our audio recording of the Sunday sermons has transitioned into the production and recording of the live stream of the 9:30 Sunday service. We also live streamed both the 7:00 and 10:00 Christmas Eve services as well as one memorial service. We currently have a group of 10 current and former Deacons who do this on a rotating schedule throughout the year. Since this is a new way of accessing not only sermons but the entire church service, we've started to work on a promotional campaign to increase awareness within the Congregation. Tom Evans oversees all this work and has been instrumental in designing the promotional material. We also had a month-long exhibit in the Davidson Hall display case that showed the many programs and services Deacons perform throughout

the year. Kristin Laws did a wonderful job with the display case this year.

Memorial Services

The Deacons hosted 10 funeral or memorial receptions in the Chapel this year. We provide baked goods and/ or fruit and cheese trays as requested. Nancy Barnes continues to facilitate this ministry.

Deacon Compassion Fund

Another conduit for our ministries is the Deacon Compassion Fund. This fund offers financial assistance to those in our church or local community who are in need. We will make financial gifts available to the vendors people use for things such as car loans, rent payments, doctors bills, utility bills, etc. The lifetime maximum benefit is \$1,000.

Please make us aware of needs you may know of so that the Deacons can be even more responsive to the Congregation.

Community Service Committee

Christmas Angels

The goal of the Christmas Angel is to supply food and gifts to those in need at Christmas time. Janet Haufler and Carolyn Lolli have done a fantastic job this year including upgrading to email communication and reminders to those who have signed out an angel to make things more efficient on our end of the process and assuring all Christmas Angel receive a box for their holiday meal. For the 2018 Christmas Season we had 177 Angels. This year we had 160 Christmas angels serving approximately 220 families and over 400 children. Not included in the totals is Beacon in Kensington who receives enough food to make a meal for the whole congregation to prepare and share together.

Easter Eggs

The goal of the Easter Egg Tree is to donate food to those in need at Easter. Janet Haufler and Carolyn Lolli have had a smooth transition as they have taken over The Easter Egg Tree for 2019. Organized like the Christmas Angel, there were 135 Eggs for the tree representing over 130 needy families with approximately 152 children throughout the area.

Bible-in-a-Book-Bag

Bible-in-a-Book-Bag project provides a Bible, a book bag, and the necessary school supplies for each student at Cornerstone Christian Academy in Southwest Philadelphia. Deacons met last August to assemble the supplies requested by each classroom for the 2019–2020 school year. We raised the funds to provide book bags, school supplies and Bibles when needed for approximately 247 students at Cornerstone. Bibles were purchased for 30 2nd graders and 20 for the 8th grade class, and for all students in grades 3–7 who are new to the school. The coordinator this year was John Larkin, who has agreed to take the lead and work with the group next year.

Blood Drive

Wayne Presbyterian Church typically coordinates two big drives each year (January and June) and three smaller ones throughout the year. For 2019 – 56 units were collected in January and our June drive resulted in an additional 51 units. The smaller drives in March, August and November collected between 24 and 50 units. Combined, we collected enough blood to help over 350 people. Lynne Samson was the coordinator this year.

Career Networking

Given the challenging job market, our Career Networking group has continued their partnership with Joseph's People, (a faith-based organization committed to offering support, guidance and job counseling services to the people throughout the region who are unemployed or seeking full employment). The group meets the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of each month covering topics such as LinkedIn, social media, Excel and re-entering the work force. Some programs are needs specific for those just entering the work force and those with long term unemployment. James Barnes has stepped up into the roll as coordinator.

Rise Against Hunger

We came together February 24, 2019, from 3:00–5:00 to assemble 15,120 meals for those in need around the world. We had a record number of just over 100 volunteers to pack those meals in one hour and 20 minutes. Our next event for Rise Against Hunger will

be sometime in late February or early March 2020. We would like to raise enough money to do 20,000 meals this year. We have been fortunate to have partnered UML Rotary who contributed much needed money and volunteers. We have their commitment to participate again in 2020.

Mission Committee

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." Matthew 25:34–36

As we strive to become a School for Love, and specifically, a Matthew 25 church, the mission committee has continued to explore ways in which we can make mission more central in the lives of all our members, rather than the work of those on one committee. To this end, we have held several Love Your Neighbor (LYN) events over the course of the year and have successfully involved WPC members and non-members in service projects with mission partners such as the Radnor Township Civic Association and Baker Industries. Sarah Hostetter, Mission Director, has proposed a structural change in which monthly mission committee meetings will be replaced by bi-monthly meetings, open to the congregation, to be held on Sundays over lunch. These gatherings will present an opportunity to learn about our mission partners, to understand their particular needs, and to discover new ways to engage with them and serve. We are hopeful that these events will create an opportunity for cross-pollination of the various groups within the church that already perform service: Deacons, WinGS, Youth, etc. To facilitate this more creative approach to mission, the business of monthly mission meetings will now be conducted at the subcommittee level and via email when possible. We are considering some alternate names for mission, in an effort to attract a greater cross-section of the congregation and also those in the community.

This year, Session voted on two uses for the Shalitta Fund, a bequest left by Roberta Shalitta for the purpose of mission. One portion of the funds was dedicated to the rehabilitation of the Radnor Township Civic Association, the oldest African-American Civic Association on the Main Line, located on Highland Avenue in Wayne. This facility had fallen into signif-

icant disrepair, and following its renovation with the use of Shalitta funds, it will become a vibrant community center once again, offering after-school tutoring, senior exercise classes, and a community gathering space, among others. The other portion of the Shalitta bequest was designated for a housing initiative in Southwest Philadelphia, through one of our longtime mission partners, the Southwest Community Development Corporation. This project seeks to rehabilitate dilapidated homes in Southwest and make them available to low-income residents, with the hope of stemming gentrification and stabilizing the community.

Please read on to learn about the many exciting and hopeful activities of our mission subcommittees. As we begin a new year that marks the 150th anniversary of Wayne Presbyterian Church, we invite you to consider the ways in which you are called to love your neighbor.

Neighbors Helping Neighbors (NHN) – Local Mission

Frederic Buechner said that the place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet. Local Mission at WPC is our faithin-action whereby neighbors are helping neighbors. Inspired by Scripture, we endeavor to help disadvantaged neighbors in the Wayne area:

- For hard-to-employ adults who are disabled, experiencing homelessness, recovering from substance use or are on probation or parole: *Baker Industries*;
- For the healing of the spirits of children, families, and communities broken by trauma including violence, neglect, addiction, poverty, mental illness, racism, and other serious societal problems: the Village [formerly Presbyterian Children's Village and recently re-named Gemma Services];

- For local families [households with minor children] experiencing homelessness: *Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Main Line*;
- For youth that live in pockets of dominantly minority and economically under-resourced neighborhoods needing academic, social, and cultural mentoring and life skills coaching: *Main Line Mentoring*;
- For families in all age and racial ethnic categories in the Wayne area experiencing chronic food insecurity: *Great Valley Food Cupboard* and *Wayne United Methodist Church Food Pantry*;
- For foreign seafarers docked in the Port of Philadelphia and restricted on board ship experiencing emotional and spiritual loneliness: *Mission to Chinese Seamen*;
- For foreign refugees legally granted entry in need of support settling and assimilating into life in the U.S. in our area: *Main Line Refugee Resettlement Group*; and
- For senior citizens seeking to stay in their homes and remain healthy, and in need of household assistance and /or transportation: *Wayne Senior Center* and *Surrey Services for Seniors*.

Local Mission highlights in 2019 included:

We continue to offer hospitality and short-term lodging and food in our church for temporarily displaced families through the Interfaith Hospitality Network of the Main Line. We were apart of the celebration of Radnor Township's occupancy approval of the re-opening of the Radnor Township Civic Association's non-profit Community Center on Highland Avenue to the public. With Sessions approval we awarded integrated grants from the Martha Shalitta Bequest to Main Line Mentoring, Wayne Senior Center, and RTCA in support of local youth and senior programs. WPC collected, transported, and donated more than 2,000 lbs of food to local food cupboards for the third consecutive year. NHN provided connections between WPC parishioners and Local Mission partners via several Love Your Neighbor day-of-service work projects.

We were apart of knitting hundreds of warm balaclava face and neck warmers for ditty hospitality gift bags for Chinese & foreign seamen during the Christmas season.

We participated in the merging of our partner, the Village, with Silver Springs – Martin Luther School in Plymouth Meeting to become Gemma Services, promoting hope and healing through mental health services, education, and specialized support for vulnerable and at-risk children and families. We supported the 3rd annual summer Unity in the Community Block Party on Highland Avenue, and continued support to the Main Line Refugee Resettlement Group together with BMPC of a Guinean mother and two pre-school children seeking asylum in the U.S.

Global Ministry - International

Social Justice Ministry

Hunger, homelessness, racism, and the preservation of our environment are the major issues in the Committee's interrelated education and advocacy work. The Committee sponsored several adult education presentations throughout the year. Presentations included "Being Black in Wayne" to commemorate Black History Month. Presenters were Pam Deans and Kevin Stroman, local African-American residents, who spoke about their childhood—and more recent—experiences in our area.

In February we hosted presentations on childhood education; Donna Cooper, of PCCY, and Carol Austen, of First Up, shared their knowledge about early childhood education.

In May we planted a pollinator garden on the east side of the Chapel. Plants native to our area which attract bees, butterflies, and birds were donated and cultivated by church members. The garden was not only beautiful, but also supported the development of several monarch butterflies during the season. Also in May we sponsored a film titled The BURDEN which addresses the military's concerns about climate change, followed by a panel discussion. Forty percent of our church's energy usage is now met by renewable, mostly wind, energy sources. Our church became a PC-USA Earth Care Congregation this year, a status that we are working to maintain by continuing to decrease our environmental footprint.

In June, Social Justice Committee members met with United States Representative Mary Gay Scanlon to share our concerns about domestic issues. Our Social Justice Committee feels called to empower others to join them as they take seriously this call to show Christs love through education, advocacy, and action.

City Lights Ministry - Local to Philadelphia

We are approaching our 25th year serving in the Kingsessing neighborhood of SW Philadelphia. Under the leadership of Rev. Cean James, relationships with our partners (over 30) continue to strengthen and we are exploring new avenues of reaching out to other groups in that neighborhood. We are working with the The Bartram Choice Neighborhoods Transformation Plan, an opportunity to create a comprehensive plan to revitalize Bartram Village and the surrounding area to improve the quality of life and attract additional investment.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) awarded a Choice Neighborhoods Planning & Action Grant to the Philadelphia Housing Authority (PHA) to guide a two-year, community-driven planning process followed by a year and a half to implement physical neighborhood improvements. Centered around the redevelopment of Bartram Village, the Transformation Plan will also explore ways to revitalize the surrounding Kingsessing neighborhood. This plan has the possibility of transforming SW Philadelphia in a way that will bring needed resources to the community. It also could lead to the gentrification of the neighborhood and the displacement of current residents. One way to avoid this displacement is with our partnership with Southwest Community Development Center (SWCDC).

WPC has provided funding for a housing initiative through a bequest given to the mission of the church by Martha Shalitta. SWCDC will rehab a house given to them by the Philadelphia Housing Authority for a qualified family to buy. The strategy is to keep continuing this process to help keep gentrification at bay so that housing remains affordable in this neighborhood.

Cornerstone Christian Academy (K–8) has leaped ahead academically this year and we see their students

able to compete in a strong academic arena as they move into high school. We have strengthened our relationship with Outley House, a men's shelter, by serving in their kitchen periodically. We also provide the residents with small Christmas gifts such as hats and gloves.

We are so thankful for the commitment of Joe Kauffman and Yoni Draiblate for the Music Transforms concerts benefitting Mitchell School students with violin lessons now in its fifth year. Thanks to our congregation and our community for supporting these events. Sherwood Christian Outreach continues with a soup kitchen providing a lunch meal twice a week. Thanks to all the volunteers who serve and support with cakes and other donations. Because of your contributions we served 73 meals though the SHARE Thanksgiving drive. In December, our 6th annual Vigil was held in the neighborhood to honor those whose lives have been taken prematurely in violence. Stop by our table in the connector on Sundays to visit and check out all our activities and volunteer opportunities.

Personnel Committee

The Mission of the Personnel Committee is to provide an orderly, focused and considerate way for the Session to build a healthy work environment; to recommend to the Session policies, procedures and practices that anticipate outcomes before they happen; to provide counsel and support for the staff; to develop shared expectations so there are no surprises and to provide a place where issues can be addressed before they become personal situations (Adapted from "Guidelines for Session Personnel Committees: A statement of the functions and accountability to the Sessions of a Personnel Committee", PC (USA) publication).

Committee Membership

Elder Lisa Packer stepped down as chair of the Personnel Committee in 2019 when her term on Session expired. Replacing Lisa as chair was Elder Brian Clapp. We thank Lisa for her leadership, ongoing commitment to the church, and continued service on the committee. Other committee members include Deacon Anne McCrary, Jim Clark, Lynn Clouser, Meg Rosecky, and Steve Smith. Sandy Kheradi rolled off the committee after many years of faithful and dedicated service as both a chair and committee member.

Staffing Taskforce

In early 2019, Session created a Staffing Task Force comprised of 3 ruling elders (Brian Clapp, Howard Holden, and Liz Walton) and 3 staff members (Rev. Casey Thompson, Rev. Cheni Khonje, and Kelli Masters) charged with reviewing and making recommendations to Session to ensure staffing is aligned with the current and anticipated future needs of Wayne Presbyterian Church.

The task force's first area of focus was pastoral staff as this was an important input for the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee (APNC) as they began the process of looking for two associate pastors. The taskforce recommended, and Session approved, the move to an Executive Pastor model. As such the APNC will call one associate with the skills, interest, and expertise to serve as Executive Pastor and focus

on administration and operations in addition to their other pastoral responsibilities. The APNC will call a second associate to serve as Program Pastor primarily focused on education and discipleship. The benefit of this Executive Pastor model is that it frees the Senior Pastor (Reverend Casey Thompson) from a heavy focus on administration and operations so that energy can be spent on preaching/worship and engaging with the congregation.

The task force also made the difficult recommendation to outsource our core custodial function. The primary advantage of outsourcing is that the significant cost saving fund a new, and much needed, professional facilities management function that will ensure the safety and sustainable our building. The cost savings also free funds that can be used to support other critical aspects of church operations.

Staff Transitions

In early 2019, the committee joined the church in welcoming the Reverend Dr. Cheni Khonje as Interim Associate Pastor of Congregational Care. She has been a welcome, energetic, and engaging addition to our pastoral staff.

In April the Reverend Dr. Adam Hearlson accepted a pastoral calling from Overbrook Presbyterian Church which cut short his interim assignment as Associate Pastor for Education and Discipleship at WPC. While his tenure was short, he made significant contributions and formed strong connections during his interim assignment. With the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee (APNC) already working on filling the permanent roles, current pastoral staff covered Education and Discipleship rather than doing a search for another short-term interim pastor. As a result, the open interim role has not been filled.

The staff and congregation were saddened by the loss of receptionist Nancy Buck who passed away in October.

In November we implemented the outsourcing of custodial services which meant saying goodbye to our long-time custodians, John Leaper Steve Hart. Both John and Steve did good work over many years and they will be missed. Cathy Chandler remains with us in a reconfigured administrative housekeeper role

focused on providing daytime housekeeping and the coordination of her work with the outsourced function to meet the day-to-day needs of the operation and the congregation. We also welcomed Chris White to WPC. Chris is providing part-time outsourced facilities management support services.

Other Committee Activities

Beyond our ongoing efforts to maintain effective communications with the church staff and to support all of our ordained and non-ordained staff in their roles, we continue to guide WPC in controlling healthcare costs while providing necessary coverage to the staff. Coverage for 2020 will be the same but rates will be down slightly from 2019.

The committee looks forward to welcoming, and helping to support, our new associate pastors as the APNC completes their work and calls are accepted in 2020. We also anticipate working on the review and of job descriptions during 2020 to ensure each description is accurate, complete, and up to date.

We thank the pastoral, program, and office staff for their tireless work and the many ways they support the congregation and our community of faith and fellowship.

Stewardship Committee

As of early January 2020, financial pledges to the 2020 Stewardship Campaign have been received from 332 individuals and families, representing 68.4% of the \$2 million funding goal. While to-date these results are trending behind last year at the same time, additional pledges typically continue to be received throughout the remainder of the first quarter. Follow up letters and telephone calls by the stewardship committee are underway to remind church members who have not yet pledged of the importance of their pledges. The members of the congregation of Wayne Presbyterian Church have always been exceptionally generous stewards of the church, freely offering their time, talent and treasure in support of the church's operation, its mission and its programs.

The current campaign is gathering momentum and shows some promising characteristics. Of those who have pledged for 2020, congregants increasing their pledges over last year outnumber those decreasing their pledges by 135 to 46. The total pledge increases to date is more than \$113,000 and decreases are just more than \$69,000. Moreover, we have received 26 new pledges totaling more than \$65,000. We believe that if we can continue at the current pace, we can reach our goal.

The Stewardship Committee of Session consists of David Benway (chair), Ron Race, Park Blatchford, Bill Lawrence, Pete Forrest, Susan O' Rourke and Derek Pimlett. The committee is also grateful to church administrative staff members Ruth Wisniewski, Neil Hartman and Mary Lou Kendus for the assistance in fulfilling the responsibilities of Stewardship.

WinGS - Women in God's Service - strives to nurture friendships through shared fellowship, the study of scripture, and outreach to mission partners at home and abroad.

The WinGS Board meets on the third Thursday of each month (except for December, June, July, and August) at 9:30 a.m. in the Calvin Room. Current board members are Ruth Dudt; Susan Hirshman; Pamela Jensen; Marty Rowley; Avis Rueger, moderator; Angela Tait; Linda Teets and Debby Vogel. New board members are always welcome.

Women's Bible Study

The WinGS Women's Bible Study, coordinated by Angela Tait, offers a wide range of classes that in 2019 approximately 60 women registered for each semester. This year our offerings included books of the New Testament, topical biblical studies, best selling book discussions, and a parenting series. Early risers enjoyed the bi-weekly Word Before Work Wednesdays at 6:30 am with The Book of Mark as the Spring class, and 1&2 Peter and Jude by NT Wright as our Fall study. Our weekly program, Women in the Word, meets Wednesdays from 9:30-11:30 am and offered two classes per semester: Confessing the Beatitudes and a study of Inspired by Rachel Held Evans in the Spring; and Spiritual Warfare and The Book of Mark in the Fall. The MOMS Bible Study gathers every 2nd and 4th Thursday of the month at 9:30 am and studied Sticky Faith: Everyday Ideas to Build Lasting Faith in your Kids by Drs. Karen Powell & Chap Clark in the Spring and The Secret Joy of a Surrendered Life by Laura Story in the Fall.

We are grateful for the continued dedication and talent of our wonderful teachers, leaders, and facilitators: the Rev. Dr. Anne Clark Duncan, Pam Clark, Dory Hoxie, Becky Greenhow, Janice Mack, and Angela Tait.

MOMS (Ministry of Motherhood)

MOMs meets weekly on Thursdays in the Fireside room from 9:30–11:30 am with childcare provided by

Jenny Moeckel and her team. Coordinated by Debbie Rothkopf, Pam Clark, Robin Herbert, and Courtney Bodnar, MOMs offers moments over coffee and refreshments for fellowship, prayer, devotions, practical parental caregiving and marital support, and mission work to women, children, and families. We serve women raising children from birth through high school within our church and greater community. We plan regular girl's night out events in and around downtown Wayne for Thursday morning regular attendees as well as working moms who can't join us on Thursday mornings. This year's bi-weekly Bible Study, led by Pam Clark, focused on two insightful books by Christian women raising children (titles referenced in Women's Bible Study, above). New women are encouraged to join at any time!

Needlecrafters

Led by Ruth Dudt, this long-standing group typically meets on Mondays to stitch items for our church, the nursery school, and our mission partners. Historically, projects have included hand-sewn smocks for young school children, pillows and other items for the Lakota Native American tribe in South Dakota, purses for women's shelters, winter hats and scarves for Broad Street Ministry, and mending of choir robes. Last Spring, Needlecrafters assisted in making blankets and pillowcases for the May "Love Your Neighbor" event.

Prayer Shawl Ministry

Coordinated by Linda Teets, this is a ministry to comfort those suffering from illness or trauma with the gift of a handmade prayer shawl. Women in this group meet two Monday afternoons a month to lovingly and prayerfully knit the shawls. Dozens of people in our church and community have been comforted with the gift of a shawl and its accompanying prayer card depicting the laying on of hands of the women who created the shawl. These thoughtful gifts are available through the church office.

Women's Retreat

On February 1–2, 2019, the women's retreat, titled "Choosing Joy" was led by the Kelli Masters at the IHM Spirituality Center in Malvern. Over 70 women signed up to be inspired Kelli's presentation, which was based on two books: Book of Joy by Desmond Tutu

and the 14th Dalai Lama; and Have You Filled a Bucket Today? by Carol McCloud. Youth Ministry Committee

The Youth Committee provides support to middle school, high school, and college aged youth in our church community through program review and oversight, prayer, and encouragement. The committee assists Andrew and Sarah Hostetter with program development and specific tasks so that the Hostetter's may pursue the vital work of relationship building and fostering the spiritual development of our youth. The mission of the WPC Youth Ministry is "to provide a loving, accepting environment where youth come to know God's love intimately, develop their faith, experience Christian community, and are empowered to serve others."

In 2019, the Youth Committee focused on supporting parents while also providing service opportunities, mission outreach, and community building within the youth program itself. For Sunday school, the middle school continued with the curriculum started last year. During the summer, Serve and Swim events allowed our youth to help organize local food cupboards which was followed by fellowship time and swimming.

Over the summer, our youth participated in mission trips to Guatemala and Southwest Philly. Both trips fostered relationship building along with opportunities for youth to serve others. This was evident in the stories and testimonials brought back by the older

youth who participated in the Guatemala mission trip.
